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Admissions Policy 2027/28 Intake

Proposed for Consultation December 2025

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Introduction

Wednesfield Technology Primary (WTP) is a 3-11 primary school supported by Shireland Collegiate Academy Trust and established via the free school programme. It aims to provide a high-quality education for local children and prepare them for secondary school and beyond in a safe and welcoming environment.

Our inclusive admissions process will at all times be open, transparent and fair, and will meet the requirements of the national Schools Admissions Code, the Appeals Code and Admissions Legislation.

Our vision & values

The Trust's vision is to provide exceptional educational opportunities for students to develop both their abilities and their respect for others. The Trust has three core beliefs:

- We believe that every pupil will have access to a whole education underpinned by academic rigour.
- We believe that every pupil should be equipped for today, tomorrow and their future lives, through teaching cutting-edge skills and the ability to discover the world and beyond.
- We believe that every pupil should be safe, happy, ambitious for themselves and respectful of all.

All of this is underpinned by a set of strong values that are central to the Trust Primary Academies. They are: **Excite / Explore / Excel**



Admission number(s)

The school is a two-form entry primary and as such has a Published Admission Number (PAN) of 60 pupils for entry in Reception.

The school will accordingly admit this number of pupils if there are sufficient applications. Where fewer applicants than the published admission number(s) for the relevant year group are received, places will be offered at the school to all those who have applied.

In accordance with the law, children with Education Health and Care Plans will be admitted to the school first where the Local Authority (LA) has specifically named Wednesfield Technology Primary as the most appropriate placement.

Application process

Applications for Wednesfield Technology Primary will be processed by the Wolverhampton Local Authority. To apply for a place at Wednesfield Technology Primary in the normal admissions round, an application must be submitted to the LA in which you live naming "Wednesfield Technology Primary" on the application form. Applications must be made by 23.59pm on 15 January 2027.

Parents/carers will be offered a place at one school by the LA. If you applied online, you will be able to log onto your account and view your offer. Where applications have been made via a paper copy of the form, an offer letter will be sent in the post with second class postage on the national offer day. In this instance, once places have been confirmed, you only need to advise the LA in writing if you *do not* wish to accept your offer.

Those that are not offered a place at Wednesfield Technology Primary will be informed on the national offer day and will be offered a place at an alternative school by the LA. Offers will be made on 16 April 2027.

Oversubscription criteria

When the school is oversubscribed, after the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan naming the school, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

1. Looked after children and children who were previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to adoption, a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order. This includes children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted¹

¹ A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local



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- 2. Priority will next be given to the siblings of pupils currently attending the school at the time the application is received.
- 3. Priority given to children of staff who has been employed at the school for a minimum of two years at the date of application or has been recruited to fill a vacant position at the school for which there is a demonstratable shortage.
- 4. Priority will next be given to children living closest to the school. Distance is measured in a straight line from the school to the home address. The distance is measured using the City of Wolverhampton Council's software, with those living closest to the school receiving the highest priority.

Tie-break

If a tie-break is necessary to determine which child is admitted, random allocation will be undertaken by the LA (or another body that is unconnected from the Academy Trust) as a tie break to decide who will be admitted.

Random allocation will not be applied to multiple birth siblings (twins, triplets, etc.) from the same family tied for the final place; we will admit them all and exceed the PAN.

Late applications

All applications received after the deadline will be considered to be late applications. Late applications will be considered after those received on time. A waiting list will be maintained by the LA until 31 December of the entry year.

Deferred entry to Reception

Parents offered a place in Reception for their child have a right to defer the date their child is admitted, or to take the place up part-time, until the child reaches compulsory school age. Places cannot be deferred beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which the offer was made. To defer entry, applicants should inform the Academy in writing including when they intend their child to start school.

Children reach compulsory school age on the prescribed day following their fifth birthday, or on their fifth birthday if it falls on a prescribed day. The prescribed days are 31st August, 31st December and 31st March.

Admission of children outside their normal age group

Parents may request that their child is admitted outside of their normal age group, for example summer born children (born between 1 April and 31 August) can



delay and start in reception rather than year 1. To do so parents must submit an application for the child's normal age group along with a written letter to the LA and the Academy outlining the reasons for the delay request prior to the deadline.

When such a request is made, the Academy Trust will make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned. In accordance with the School Admissions Code, this will include taking account of:

- Parents' views
- Information about the child's academic, social and emotional development
- Where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional
- Whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group
- Whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely
- The head teacher's views
- The impact of any decision on the child, parents /carers and the school

Wherever possible, requests for admission outside a child's normal age group will be processed as part of the main admissions round. They will be considered on the basis of the admission arrangements laid out in this policy, including the oversubscription criteria listed.

Applications will not be treated as a lower priority if parents have made a request for a child to be admitted outside the normal age group.

Parents will always be informed of the reasons for any decision on the year group a child should be admitted to. Parents do not have a right to appeal if they are offered a place at the school but it is not in their preferred age group.

Waiting lists

The school will operate a waiting list for each open year group. Where the school receives more applications for places than there are places available, the LA will maintain a waiting list until 31 December after the year of entry, after which the LA will cleanse each term to confirm parent wishes to remain on the list.

In year admissions

An application can be made for a place for a child at any time outside the normal admission round and the child will be admitted where there are places available. To apply for a place other than the normal intake into the reception class, parents must



apply using the in-year application form available on LA's website (<u>School admissions | City Of Wolverhampton Council</u>).

Where there are places available but more applications than places, the published oversubscription criteria, as set out for the normal round of admissions, will be applied. If there are no places available, the child will be added to the waiting list (as defined in the previous section).

Parents will be advised of the outcome of their application in writing from the LA and, where the decision is to refuse their child a place, have the right to appeal to an independent appeal panel.



Appeals

The Governing Body of WTP has contracted the appeals function to Wolverhampton LA.

Parents have a legal right to appeal for a place at any school they have applied for where their child has been refused a place. If you wish to appeal, contact the LA's Admission and Appeals Service for an appeal form.

Before deciding to appeal, you may wish to contact the Advisory Centre for Education (0808 800 5793) who will provide you with free, impartial advice.

If you choose to exercise your right of appeal, arrangements will be made for you to attend an appeal hearing. The Appeals Panel is independent of the LA and WTP and is arranged by Democratic Services of the Council. The Panel will consist of 3 or 5 members. There will also be someone representing WTP (this will be a LA Officer) and a clerk from Democratic Services in attendance. At the meeting, you will be invited to say why you would like your child to go to WTP rather than the one offered. The LA officer will explain why a place at WTP has been refused.

You cannot appeal for WTP if you did not list it on your common application form. The LA recommends that you accept the school that has been offered to you even if you decide to appeal for WTP. By accepting the school offered, you will guarantee a school place for your child. If you refuse the place, you are likely to be reducing the options which may be available to you. Accepting the place will have no bearing on the outcome of your appeal.

Appeal hearings will normally be held within 40 school days of the deadline for submitting an appeal i.e during the late Spring and early Summer Terms. Families will be given 10 days' notice of an appeal hearing date and time. Appeals for heavily oversubscribed schools can last for up to two weeks. You will be notified of the decision no later than five school days after the last hearing unless there is good reason why the decision has been delayed.

The Council, Councillors and even Members of Parliament are unable to change its decision. If you think that the appeal process has been conducted unfairly you can complain to the Local Government Ombudsman. However, the Ombudsman does not have the power to change the decision of the Panel.

All arrangements for allocation of school places and for appeals will be in line with the School Admissions Code and the School Admission Appeals Code published by the Department for Education.



Notes

Home address:

The home address is where a child normally lives. Where a child lives with parents with shared parental responsibility, each for part of a week, the address where the child lives is determined using a joint declaration from the parents stating the pattern of residence. If a child's residence is split equally between both parents, then parents will be asked to determine which residential address should be used for the purpose of admission to school. If no joint declaration is received where the residence is split equally by the closing date for applications, the home address will be taken as the address where the child is registered with the doctor. If the residence is not split equally between both parents then the address used will be the address where the child sleeps for the majority of the school week.

Sibling:

'Sibling' means a natural brother or sister, a half brother or sister, a legally adopted brother or sister or half-brother or sister, a stepbrother or sister or other child living in the same household as part of the same family who, in any of these cases, will be living at the same address at the date of their application for a place.

Looked after children:

Children in the care of a local authority as set out in Section 22 of the Children Act 1989.

Previously looked after children:

Children who were in the care of a local authority as set out in Section 22 of the Children Act 1989 but ceased to be so as a result of adoption, a child arrangements order or special guardianship order. Also children who appear to the academy trust to have been in state care outside England and ceased to be so because they were adopted.
